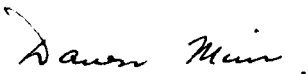

Such an article by Ms Joann Schmider considers the studies about Aborigines in Queensland primary and secondary schools.

During 1981 Dr Anna Shnukal interviewed Torres Strait Islander people who are now settled in coastal towns to investigate patterns of language background and maintenance. The first of two articles reporting her findings is included in this issue.

It is most pleasing to have a contribution in the *Across Australia...from Teacher to Teacher* section. It is this section that provides the 'practical', 'in the field' balance the journal sets out to achieve.

For interest and, hopefully, comment and discussion, the relevant section of the recently published *Commonwealth Standards for Australian Schools* has been included in this issue. The Commonwealth Schools Commission has produced a range of recurrent resource standards which it judges desirable for Australian schools.
